

Gary M. Diamond, Ph.D. is a licensed clinical psychologist and family therapist and professor in the Department of Psychology at Ben-Gurion University of the Negev in Israel. He is also the Director and Chief Psychologist of the Department's Community Clinic which delivered psychological first aid within 24 hours to individuals, groups, and families from Kfar Aza, Re'im, Ofakim, and Sderot who survived the October 7 massacre and continues to treat them today. The team employs a variety of intervention approaches to help individuals and families overcome their

trauma symptoms, create a coherent narrative of the events they suffered through, re-engage in activities they find meaningful and enjoyable, and re-envision their future in these trying times.

Dr. Diamond is a co-developer of attachment-based family therapy (ABFT) for depressed and suicidal adolescents and the primary developer of attachment-based family therapy for sexual/gender minority young adults and their non-accepting parents (ABFT-SGM). In 2014, along with Guy S. Diamond (no family relation), he received the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention's annual research award. His book on ABFT-SGM, co-authored by Rotem Boruchovitz-Zamir, was recently published by the American Psychological Association. Dr. Diamond trains people internationally in ABFT for SGM adolescents and young adults.
